Foundation Moment with Jeff Balzer:

She walks from her home in a remote Nepal village to the local birthing center for her last prenatal checkup. As she makes her way through a drenching thunderstorm, she sees the lights ahead go out. Power cuts happen often in her village, sometimes they last 2 weeks. But as she looks ahead she sees the power remains on in the birthing center. The birthing center lights remain on because they are powered by a solar suitcase. The solar suitcase was donated by a group in 2014 and since that time there have been no maternal or baby deaths in the area. For just a \$120.00 donation you can help save a life.

Word of the Week:

- Bury the hatchet is an American English idiom meaning "to make peace". The phrase is an allusion to the
 figurative or literal practice of putting away the tomahawk at the cessation of hostilities among or by Native
 Americans in the Eastern United States, specifically concerning the formation of the Iroquois Confederacy and in
 Iroquois custom in general. Weapons were to be buried or otherwise cached in time of peace.
- The expression to "extend an olive branch" means an offer of peace or reconciliation. It has a biblical origin. It
 comes from the Book of Genesis. The sign that the flood was over was an olive branch brought back to the
 ark by a dove.

Olive branches are symbols of peace. They continue to be used in works of art which are meant to suggest peace. the offer of an olive branch would suggest that someone is tired of war, whether it be an actual war or a falling out between friends.

- The phrase "to turn a blind eye" is attributed to an incident in the life of Admiral Horatio Nelson. Nelson was blinded in one eye early in his Royal Navy career. During the Battle of Copenhagen in 1801 the cautious Admiral Sir Hyde Parker, in overall command of the British forces, sent a signal to Nelson's forces ordering them to discontinue the action. Naval orders were transmitted via a system of signal flags at that time. When this order was brought to the more aggressive Nelson's attention, he lifted his telescope up to his blind eye, saying, "I have a right to be blind sometimes. I really do not see the signal," and most of his forces continued to press home the attack. The frigates supporting the line-of-battle ships did break off, in one case suffering severe losses in the retreat.
- Prior to 2008, the figurative sense of "red herring" was thought to originate from a supposed technique of training young scent hounds. There are variations of the story, but according to one version, the pungent red herring would be dragged along a trail until a puppy learned to follow the scent. Later, when the dog was being trained to follow the faint odor of a fox or a badger, the trainer would drag a red herring (whose strong scent confuses the animal) perpendicular to the animal's trail to confuse the dog. The dog eventually learned to follow the original scent rather than the stronger scent. A variation of this story is given, without mention of its use in training, in The Macmillan Book of Proverbs, Maxims, and Famous Phrases (1976), with the earliest use cited being from W. F. Butler's Life of Napier, published in 1849. Brewer's Dictionary of Phrase and Fable (1981) gives the full phrase as "Drawing a red herring across the path", an idiom meaning "to divert attention from the main question by some side issue"; here, once again, a "dried, smoked and salted" herring when "drawn across a fox's path destroys the scent and sets the hounds at fault." Another variation of the dog story is given by Robert Hendrickson (1994) who says escaping convicts used the pungent fish to throw off hounds in pursuit.
